Burden Museum & Gardens Welcome Center

Have you ever gone to visit someone who you knew had a magnificent house but when you arrived there was no front door? Have you ever gotten to a destination you knew was filled with treasures, but you had no idea how to get to them? Have you ever stumbled upon a magical place and wondered how it came to be? That is what most visitors experience when they arrive at Burden Museum & Gardens.

With your support, you can help enhance the visitor experience to one of the most treasured places in Baton Rouge. The Burden Museum & Gardens Welcome Center will serve as the front door for friends and visitors with information on all the special places they can explore on their journey through the 440-acre property in the heart of Louisiana's capital city. It also will provide an overview of the rich history of the Burden family and the Burden property, which was one of the largest donations ever made to LSU. The Burden family made this gift to the community as a unique and special place to discover and contemplate nature. It is a place to understand history through the Rural Life Museum and Windrush Gardens, conduct LSU- and LSU AgCenter-based research and educational programs for our state and our community, and to learn and reflect on hopes for the future. This facility will serve the community, the LSU AgCenter and the LSU A&M campus by increasing capacity for classes, small workshops, meetings, educational programs, receptions and celebrations.

The Welcome Center design, by local architects Eskew Dumez Ripple, provides a space to view a different Louisiana landscapes from each of the four sides: wetlands, woodlands and pastoral and designed landscapes. The roof of the Welcome Center is not your typical gabled roof but is designed so that all outer sides slope to the center so that *continued on page 6*

•In August one of our signature fundraising events, the Byzantine Icon Workshop, returned. Since this popular workshop began under Ginnie Bolin's guidance in 2013, it has grown from an annual event to a semiannual one, and except for 2020 (COVID-19), it has remained so. Under the leadership of Diana Wells and Kitty Hessburg Wiemer, and with the hands-on assistance of volunteer committee members, instructors and the hospitality team, the workshop serves as a five-day meditational retreat for painting participants, which is especially helpful in today's unusual times. The August workshop portrayed St. Matthew the Apostle. Plans are already in the works for February 2022, when St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, will be the subject portrayed.

- •The monthly Reflections in the Garden lectures continued through the summer with reduced audiences enjoying topics on pollinator gardens, our Louisiana State Arboretum, and critical issues around coastal conservation and restoration.
- •The popular guided birding walks continued during the last Saturdays in summer and into fall. Those spots fill quickly. Tickets at www.Eventbrite.com.

And now the traditional fall activities are well underway.

- •October Saturdays are filled with the Corn Maze at Burden as folks enjoy all the outdoor family fun offered. This year continues that tradition with antique tractors, the petting zoo, pumpkin patch and so much more. Tickets are required and are presale only and are available at www.lsu.edu/botanic-gardens.
- •Î'm really looking forward to attending the newly crafted Wine & Roses Rambler to be held on Sunday, Nov. 7. (See details elsewhere in this newsletter.) Chair Janie Braud and her committee have designed a festive, creative brunch in a garden-party style that promises to become yet another signature event of the Botanic Gardens.

Fall is great walking weather. Take a stroll through the Tropical Garden across from the Conference Center. Hike the trails and wander along Mosaic Boardwalk at Black Swamp and through the butterfly meadow. Sign up and join a guided birding hike.

The program offers three options to create a lasting tribute: engraved pavers, iron benches and live oak dedications.

A bronze plaque will be placed at the base of the tree with your special message. 




all landscapes are visible through the numerous covered areas. The inward-sloped roof will also serve as water feature with rainwater flowing into the central rain garden. The rain garden represents green infrastructure that mirrors the function of our wetlands serving as a sink for stormwater and provides visitors with an immersive learning experience.

The Welcome Center will include numerous program elements to enhance the visitor experience. The entry area will be visible as you drive to the tree-lined permeable surface parking area. Walking from the parking area you will








cross bioswales that will assist with water retention and percolation. The Welcome Center will sit approximately 2 feet off the ground on a pier system with steps and a ramp bringing you to an inviting outdoor covered entry area for visitor orientation. This space will include an interactive map of the property, space for exhibits and views to the surrounding landscapes. From this area you will be able to view the central rain garden and access the restrooms, offices of the event coordinator and communications coordinator, and the Charlie and Carol Lamar Reception Area for orientation and tickets as well as the gift shop. The gift shop will provide visitors with the opportunity to purchase plants and plant-related items that are unique to Burden. The reception area will also provide space for interior exhibits, and it will serve as the primary entry to the event center. The event center will accommodate 300-seated auditorium style and capacity for 250 seated at tables. The north wall of this room will open to the event lawn, which will double the capacity and allow for over 600 people to enjoy the indoor/ outdoor space. The café will be located at the west end of the Welcome Center and will include an outdoor dining area overlooking the rain garden, orchid house and formal landscape. This area will also serve for outdoor educational programing, such as workshops and cooking demonstrations.

A beautifully landscaped entrance and surrounding landscape, designed by CARBO Landscape Architecture, will provide new visitors and returning friends an escape to nature. The Louisiana-themed landscapes surrounding the





Welcome Center will tell the story of how water has been and will continue to be the common theme of how we have lived in those landscapes throughout history and how we continue to be resilient by understanding the changing environment and combining that with the use of green infrastructure.
