# Birding at Burden

We held a grand opening for the birding loops at the first of the year. This project was led by Luke Laborde, LSU AgCenter interim vice president of agriculture; Ashley Long, assistant professor in the LSU School of Renewable Natural Resources; Sarah Rayner, Botanic Gardens youth education coordinator; and student intern Csanyi Matusiczky. There are six loops that include six different

habitats. You can tour each habitat as a self-guided walk, or you can take a guided walk with local experts by registering on Eventbrite. There are two birding kiosks, one at the Trees and Trails trail head and another at the entrance to the Rural Life Museum. Happy birding!
