Course Overview:

In this course, you will be introduced to the history and politics of Latin America. We will start with a brief introduction of the colonial period and the independence struggles of the Americas, then move into the major political developments of the 20th century up to the present day. No knowledge of Latin America is assumed prior to this course and therefore, we will be spending a significant amount of time studying the political histories of a number of individual Latin American countries as well as addressing several topics that transcend borders, such as U.S.-Latin American relations, revolutionary movements, civil war, democracy, and dictatorship.

Evaluation:

Class Participation and Homework: I expect all students to attend class on a regular basis and participate in class discussion. In addition, I may assign short homework assignments in class throughout the semester based on in-class activities.

Exams: There will be three exams throughout the semester that relate to the readings, lectures and videos. The exams are not cumulative and only cover material since the last exam. Prior to each exam I will provide you with a study guide. All exams must be taken on the specified date.

If you have a DOCUMENTED illness, emergency or excused absence on the date of an exam, you may take an alternate exam during the scheduled final exam period.

Public Opinion Project: You are required to write a report based on public opinion data from Latin America that examines attitudes about democracy and about the United States. In preparation for writing the report, we will spend two weeks in a computer lab to teach you how to analyze a large public opinion dataset that includes responses to a detailed questionnaire from roughly 20,000 individuals across 18 Latin American countries. The project will consist of generating several tables of public opinion data using the statistical software package Stata, and briefly describing the results from the tables.

Geography quiz: Since this class is about a particular geographic region, it is very important that everyone knows where each country in the Americas is located. There is a geography quiz at the beginning of the semester that will require you to identify the major countries and their capitals on a blank map.

Trade Simulation: At the end of the semester we will conduct a simulated negotiation of a regional trade agreement between multiple countries. You will be graded on your participation during the simulation and on the generation of a response essay after the simulation. More details of the simulation will be provided in class.

Literature review: You are required to write a 6-page literature review based on a minimum of 6 academic sources provided to you. The literature review will provide you the opportunity to examine in greater detail one of the topics covered in class. I will supply a list of sources for each possible topic, and you must write a critical essay that briefly summarizes, and compares and contrasts the various arguments in each of the selected readings. Each topic will be guided by a general research question, and the supplied readings will provide a variety of answers to that question. The literature review is due at the date and time of the final exam. Further guidance and example literature reviews will be provided in class.
